**REGULAR MEETING OF THE  
POLICE STANDARDS ADVISORY COUNCIL  
JANUARY 17, 2018**

**I. CALL TO ORDER**

Chairman Sheriff Jerry Watson called the monthly meeting of the Police Standards Advisory Council to order at 9:03 AM. A current copy of the Nebraska Open Meetings Act was on hand and available for reference. Notice of the meeting was published in the Lincoln Journal Star on Monday, January 8, 2018. Roll call of members; Sheriff Jerry Watson, Chief Tracy Wolf, Chief Jeff Bliemeister, Sheriff Larry Koranda, Chief Timothy Larby, and Mr. Matthew McCarthy were present. NSP Council representative, retired Lieutenant Colonel Thomas Schwarten, was not present and a replacement had not been appointed yet.

**II. APPOINTMENT OF CHAIR**

Sheriff Watson opened the floor for nominations and election of Chairman. Sheriff Koranda nominated Chief Tracy Wolf. Mr. McCarthy seconded the nomination. Hearing no further nominations or discussion, roll call vote was taken. Voting in favor of the motion; Sheriff Jerry Watson, Chief Jeffrey Bliemeister, Sheriff Larry Koranda, Chief Timothy Larby, and Mr. Matthew McCarthy. Chief Tracy Wolf abstained.

**III. NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF VICE-CHAIR**

Chief Wolf opened the floor for nominations and election of Vice-Chair.

**MOTION**

Sheriff Koranda nominated Chief Jeffery Bliemeister. Mr. Matthew McCarthy seconded the motion. Hearing no further nominations or discussion roll call vote was taken. Voting in favor of the motion; Chief Timothy Larby, Mr. Matthew McCarthy, Sheriff Jerry Watson, Chief Tracy Wolf and Sheriff Larry Koranda. Chief Jeffrey Bliemeister abstained.

#### **IV. APPROVAL OF DECEMBER 20, 2017 P.S.A.C. MINUTES**

##### **MOTION**

Chief Timothy Larby motioned to approve the December 20, 2017 minutes as presented. Sheriff Koranda seconded the motion. Voting in favor of the motion; Sheriff Larry Koranda, Chief Timothy Larby, Mr. Matthew McCarthy, Sheriff Jerry Watson, Chief Tracy Wolf, and Chief Jeffrey Bliemeister.

#### **V. ACADEMY REPORTS**

##### **A. Director – N.L.E.T.C.**

Mr. Muldoon reviewed the report handed out prior to the meeting stating he had calculated the number of hours the Training Center had conducted in specialized and mandatory training. 222 Courses were offered with 3,159 students and 128,257 total training hours.

##### **B. Deputy Director of Training – N.L.E.T.C.**

Deputy Director Urbanek reported the 198<sup>th</sup> Basic was in week two. They started with 48 students and was down to 46 due to an agency withdraw and a voluntary student withdraw.

Two courses were cancelled due to low enrollment;  
ARIDE - February 8-9, 2018  
Blue Courage - January 23-24, 2018

Jon Sumsion conducted a Human Factor Research Group Recertification for 22 students January 9-11.

Instructional staff attended a Gordon Graham presentation sponsored by the Nebraska State Patrol. We appreciated the opportunity to attend.

The Patrol Rifle Instructor letters are waiting final approval to be sent out to both Patrol Rifle Instructors and their respective agencies.

January 9<sup>th</sup> I conducted the annual onsite academy inspection for the Omaha Police Academy for calendar year 2018.

I have been in contact with Scott Wagner, Director of the SDLEA as they move toward the implementation, it's probably time to call the subcommittee back together. There are decisions that need to be made that will be helpful for their academy to be laid out before they begin to implement things, such as conducting tests, academy applications, and other such things.

## VI. CRIME COMMISSION REPORT

Mr. Fisher reported the Commission had three hold over bills from 2017.

LB 93 introduced by Senator Hansel - The state adopted the Automated license plate reader privacy act requiring law enforcement agencies that utilizes the ALPR's to annually report to the Commission on their practices in usage and also requires the Commission and the agency to post such reports on their website. The Bill has advanced to general file and I expect it to be adopted.

LB198 We proposed this last year through Senator McCollister on behalf of the Commission; we were proposing to eliminate the old Crimes against Children's fund that we held on to. It has no money in it, it's just a vessel for holding the funds, and the state hasn't funded it in over a decade. Because last year was a budget year, it wasn't a priority so it got tabled until this year, it has passed on general file last week with no debate, no opposition. I expect it to pass.

The last bill from 2017 is LB199, which was also introduced on our behalf from Senator McCollister. It proposes to eliminate state aid to counties with Native American reservations within that county. This is a house keeping bill, there is no money in it, and hasn't been funded in over a decade. I would like it off our books because the auditors come every year to check it. It's just redundant paperwork for us. Last year the Bill was opposed by Senator Pansing Brooks in Judiciary Committee because she wanted to hold onto it for White Clay funding. We have been in contact with Senator Brooks and she no longer has opposition to it going through, we expect it to advance out of judiciary committee and at least go on the floor.

### This Year's Bills

LB670 was introduced by Senator Krist to propose changes to the number of membership of the Nebraska Coalition for the Juvenile Justice as well as to change the required number of times the coalition is required to meet. If you will recall last year we lost, by our choice, we gave up Federal Title II grant, we only received about \$40,000 in it. The administrative funds in that at one time I had 9 people working on that grant periodically to the tune of about \$86,000, the funds just don't add up anymore. We made the voluntary choice to let it go, in addition we would have taken about a 40% hit in the aid portion of that grant because Nebraska would have been penalized from the dispirit minority context. The problem is then NCJJ was funded through Title II funds so we had transferred the funding mechanism of that to community based juvenile services aid but I

wanted the cost reduced. That body was 33 people. That is just too big of a membership to get anything done so we asked the senator to cut down the number of people on that and pare down the number of times they meet every year cause that costs out of the fund.

LB776 was introduced by Senator McCollister and proposes to delegate powers and duties to the Jail Standards Board to regulate access to telephones for inmates and county jails and to regulate the cost of that. This is not a Jail Standards or Crime Commission function, this is a DFC function. If they start regulating the amount of money that the county and jails can charge for telephone service, they are basically cutting off the counties funding mechanism. This bill is set for hearing tomorrow. The Crime Commission will be there. We will testify neutral vastly but we will make our concerns on the Bill known.

LB791 was introduced by Senator Ebke at the request of the Governor. It's a State Patrol Bill that changes some employee's bargaining rights. They are talking about taking the Sergeant's out of the bargaining unit.

LB792 a Commission Bill introduced by Senator Ebke at the request of the Governor. Proposing administrative subpoena powers to the Executive Director of the Crime Commission and a second portion of the Bill is the Truth and Resignation, Truth Determination, which will assist the Crime Commission in better tracking journeymen. Agencies to allow people to resign when they have some decertification issues, it will require the agency administrators to truthfully tell the Commission through the Change in Status form why the person resigned or was terminated. We have asked for an amendment to the bill to include retirement. Resignation, Termination, or Retirement. I believe the hearing date for this bill is the 31<sup>st</sup>.

LB818 was introduced by Senator Chambers and would require our jail inspectors to inspect the Douglas County Jail, which is currently exempt from annual inspection because of their national accreditation with the American Correctional Association. Hearing date is this Thursday.

LB955 was introduced by Senator Krist and proposes reciprocal certification to law enforcement officers from other jurisdictions and military police officers. We have contacted Senator Krist's office to let him know we are pretty certain we already fixed everything he has in his Bill a year ago when we made changes to the Administrative Procedures Act to our Administrative Rule to cover Military Police Officers. Dave and Bill have reviewed the Bill and given us their candid impressions and we have given those on to Senator Krist. Hearing is set for January 31<sup>st</sup> at 1:30 PM.

Mr. Muldoon stated he did have a concern with the Bill as it did reference, according to their MOS they shall already be deemed competent and ready for Reciprocity without any review by the Director of the Training Center and any action of the Council to be in Reciprocity. I'm not sure if that's how it's meant, but I do have a concern with it. I feel they could attend a portion(s) in our Basic where they may be lacking and get the part they may need. The rule

that is proposed, if they have the MOS, Military Police Officer, our work is done. To me that is a concern.

Mr. Fisher stated with a lot of the Bill's you don't know the intent until the debate takes place on the floor and if there is no debate on the floor, you will never know what the intent is. So this group, PSAC, was set up to be the gate keepers for that, and they need to remain the gate keepers. Nebraska does a pretty good job of vetting its people for the most part, I don't think we want to lose that. This is a start.

We still have 22 Revocation cases that are active. We do have a voluntary surrender on one that will be on the February agenda.

## **VIII. NEW BUSINESS**

### **A. Waiver of NLETC Firearms Instructor Recertification Officer Josh Loontjer, Columbus Police Department**

Ms. Urbanek stated Officer Loontjer's Firearms Instructor Certification was set to expire in 2017. According to the letter from his Captain, believed there were three recertification classes in 2017, however there were five in 2017. He was scheduled to attend one in November but needed to attend a Grand Jury and there was one in December, which is our last chance training but he attended the IMS Mapping Course being conducted the same week.

He is asking for to attend the next available firearms Instructor Recertification in 2018 in order to keep his certification.

Mr. Stolz stated referred to Title 79, Chapter 11, section 008.02; Active Duty, Medical Condition, Demonstrated Agency Emergency, or when the individual has an agency approved leave of absence that prevents the instructor from attending the recertification course, are the only grounds for an extension. The Council needs to determine if the request fits into one of these areas.

### **MOTION**

Sheriff Watson motioned to deny the request for Officer Josh Loontjer's Firearms Instructor status for his recertification based upon the fact that we lack the authority to do so under Title 79, Chapter 11, Section 008.02. Chief Larry Koranda seconded the motion. Voting in favor of the motion; Chief Timothy Larby, Mr. Matthew McCarthy, Sheriff Jerry Watson, Chief Tracy Wolf, Chief Jeffrey Bliemeister, and Sheriff Larry Koranda.

**B. Waiver of Hardship. Attending Basic Training Session  
Officer Colin Hyatt, City of Gordon P.D.**

Mr. Muldoon stated Officer Hyatt was hired April 28, 2017, the first class he was available to attend was August 21, - December 15, 2017, however Gordon had another officer attending that session and he did not successfully complete the PRET December 13, 2017 preventing him from attending the January 2, 2018-April 13, 2018. If he passes the PRET for the May 6<sup>th</sup>, 2018, Basic, he will need a waiver to attend the Basic Training Session.

Chief Clay Heath, Gordon Police Department addressed the Council stating he was requesting a hardship waiver for Colin Hyatt as he was hired April 28, 2017 and the academy class had already started on April 17, 2017, with another officer from Gordon Police Department attending the academy so the next academy for Mr. Hyatt to attend would be January 2, 2018 however Mr. Hyatt did not pass the PRET. The next session will be in May and he will be beyond his one-year of hire.

I am here to request the Council to grant a waiver of hardship today. I have been the Chief since the end of September, for about four months.

Chief Larby questioned if he thought he would be able to make the PRET the next time.

Chief Heath stated he felt he would be able to make the required amount. He was already making the required amount of push-ups and sit ups and did actually meet the required vertical and sprint. He is still working on the mile and a half.

Sheriff Watson stated he would not be allowed to exercise any powers of law enforcement until he got his certification; he cannot go out and work weekends, evenings, nothing.

Chief Heath stated he would do the academy before he would actually work the streets.

**MOTION**

Chief Larby motioned to grant the waiver for Colin Hyatt with the understanding that he does not perform law enforcement duties until such time as basic gets completed. This is conditioned upon his completion of the PRET and acceptance and successful completion of the 199<sup>th</sup> Basic Training Session. Mr. Matthew McCarthy seconded the motion. Voting in favor of the motion; Mr. Matthew McCarthy, Sheriff Jerry Watson, Chief Tracy Wolf, Chief Jeffrey Bliemeister, Sheriff Larry Koranda, and Chief Timothy Larby.

**C. Approval of Firearms Re-Certification Program  
Lincoln Police Department**

Deputy Director Urbanek stated last year Lincoln Police Department submitted a curriculum to conduct their own Firearms Instructor course and Recertification course that was approved by this body. They plan on doing the same thing this year. They have changed nothing substantially in the curriculum and have asked for this Council's approval to conduct their Firearms Instructor course and Recertification courses for 2018.

**MOTION**

Sheriff Larry Koranda motioned to approve the Lincoln Police Department's Firearms Recertification Program as presented for the 2018 year. Chief Timothy Larby seconded the motion. Voting in favor; Sheriff Jerry Watson, Chief Tracy Wolf, Sheriff Larry Koranda, Chief Timothy Larby, Mr. Matthew McCarthy. Chief Jeffrey Bliemeister Abstained.

**D. 2017 Lincoln Academy Inspection**

Deputy Director Urbanek stated in 2017 she conducted the onsite academy inspection with Sergeant Ryan Witzel, a binder of the inspection was available for those who would like to review it. There were a couple of things I am asking Sergeant Witzel to provide in 2018; a breakdown of the classes of core topic areas, legal and then the classes that are covered under legal. Patrol and then a listing of the courses that are covered under Patrol. The information is in their curriculum, it's just not listed. Lincoln does not historically conduct comprehensive testing as part of their recruit academy, it is conducted at the end of their FTO period. It's done just after they receive their state certification.

The instructors have all been approved. The course I audited was Domestic Violence. Firearms, Defensive Tactics was all squared away, I reviewed two personnel files and everything was in accordance. The one thing I noticed in the coversheet for the lesson plans some of the task numbers were not the most current. When I checked the curriculum documents submitted, I could find every task from our curriculum in their curriculum, but it didn't translate into their lesson plans, it just needs updating this year.

On the second page of my letter you will see the comparison of the outline of instructional hours between Training Center and LPD. I would recommend approving LPD's academy for 2017 with the following recommendations for 2018 as listed in the Deputy Director's report.

Chief Bliemeister stated based on conversations with Sergeant Ryan Witzel a majority of the recommendations have been completed.

## MOTION

Sheriff Watson moved to accept the Lincoln Academy inspection for the year 2017 with the recommendations from Assistant Director Urbanek: That the curriculum for the LPD Academy be broken into major topic areas that being; Legal, Patrol Officer Survival, Investigations, Human Understanding, and Traffic Operations, and include total number of hours taught in each topic area. #2. Provide documentation of the appointment of Captain Jeri Roeder to Academy Director. #3. Update the lesson plans to reflect the most current JTA numbers assigned to each objective. Chief Timothy Larby seconded the motion. Voting in favor; Chief Tracy Wolf, Sheriff Larry Koranda, Chief Timothy Larby, Mr. Matthew McCarthy, and Sheriff Jerry Watson. Chief Jeffrey Bliemeister abstained.

**E. Waiver of NLETC Basic Training Session**  
Officer Nicholas Hawthorne, Wayne Co. S.O.

Sheriff Jason Dwinell introduced himself and Nicholas Hawthorne to the Council.

Mr. Muldoon stated Mr. Hawthorne was hired January 3, 2017, was beyond his one-year of receiving basic training and they were requesting a waiver. They received a prior waiver on August 22, 2017. The Sheriff was interested in retaining his employee and I discussed with him that by Statute he needed to separate Mr. Hawthorne from law enforcement, dependent upon your interpretation it might be from the agency all together, and this complaint shall not be renewed. We have in the past, if the person was in a dispatcher/jail capacity they have stayed with the agency but reverted back to the original basis. I asked the Sheriff to present this letter and bring everything so it would be as transparent as possible so that if he retained the person in a nonlaw enforcement or a trainee capacity. It is a difficult thing to accomplish, he does not have a jail or communication center to task that person. Rather than say anything at all, I said write another waiver and he basically cannot be employed as a law enforcement officer let alone our next basic doesn't start until May 6<sup>th</sup> at which time he will have another opportunity at another PRET in April and I think with that I will turn it over to Sheriff Dwinell.

Sheriff Dwinell stated he would very much like to retain this employee. One needs to review his TC-001 Change in Status, which I sent in when I hired him. He has always been listed as a trainee. The definition for trainee is very specific in Title 79, Chapter 1, §004.29. He does not have any law enforcement capability. He has never performed any law enforcement duties. There are some agencies that put them in a uniform, put them in a cruiser, give them the blessing and send them out. I do not do that. He has never written a ticket, he does not run radar, he doesn't carry a gun. No law enforcement capabilities at all. So respectfully I have always disagreed with any letter, any title I receive for a training officer where they call him officer, he is not an officer. Officer has a very specific definition which includes certification, diploma, giving him the authority to enforce the law. He has never done that. He is a trainee. I can't overemphasize that.



I understand the Training Center's concern and I understand the statute requiring him to be certified within a year of employment that specifically has the title, "officer". He's not an officer, never have used him as such. I believe it was early December I called the Director, called Mr. Fisher, called Mr. Stolz had a conversation, what can I do to retain him? Yes, he failed the PRET. But I am here to see what I can do to possibly retain him, send him to the Training Center to become certified.

Mr. Hawthorne stated when he took the test in August, he had an injury and should have been more careful how he trained, when he came back in December, he actually missed it by just a little bit, scoring a 29 of the required 30. I know what I need to focus on. I have not done any law enforcement duties, I have worn a uniform to differentiate me so I am not following a deputy around and somebody stops me from going in somewhere. I no longer wear a uniform, I am office staff. Occasionally I go up to make sure nobody brings additional bags into the courtroom. I am not introduced as a deputy, I am introduced as a trainee. When we were out on scenes and people would come up and try to talk to me, I had a deputy that would take over and mention that I was a trainee.

Mr. Muldoon stated the correct use of trainee usually the traditional use of trainee is with Lincoln Omaha, NSP. They hire the person, they have no power they attend the academy full time and they are sworn in at a later date. We do have some agencies that do the same thing the problem is there is no other place for that person that does kind of raise a supervision issue as far as we are concerned. How do we know the guy is not in a uniform, wearing a gun, and working? We do know of other agencies that we just wouldn't want them hiring everybody as a trainee all the time and them trusting that they are not using them. That they are out in the car and wearing a gun and being sworn in. Those are more complicated questions and now we have heard from them directly and you can make your decision.

Technically there is no one year based on what they said that he has not been used, not sworn in, doesn't carry a gun. I think the problem is just how you identify what he is doing and how he is working.

Chief Larby questioned if he was a trainee this whole time but we've already granted one waiver, if I'm understanding what you've said, the one year doesn't apply.

Mr. Muldoon stated this is a form issue that we need to talk about. Trainee was never intended for the agency to hire someone as a police officer or deputy and not work them. The form was designed to get them into the Training Center as soon as possible, get them trained in under a year so we have comported with statute. I would be concerned if everyone sent people through as a trainee.

Sheriff Watson stated his year was already up, there are things at the sheriff's office that civilian staff can do so keeping him busy is not hard, but since his year is up and if he passes the PRET, what is his standing to come back in.

Sheriff Koranda stated Wayne County was five miles from him and he was very familiar with Mr. Hawthorne and what was going on. He knew he hadn't performed any law enforcement duties. Was one of the people Sheriff Dwinell talked to last fall when he was talking about what he needed to do to get Mr. Hawthorne into the Training Center. I believe I was the one that made the motion to grant the waiver just because I thought it was the cleanest thing for the record and I still voiced my concerns at that time that I didn't believe he needed a waiver because of the trainee status but I thought just for a clean record, do a waiver and get him through. The way I read the title, I don't think we need to be here discussing getting a waiver, I think he, as a trainee, should be allowed into the Training Center, but I'm glad it's on the agenda because I think we do need to decide how we treat the trainees on that form or how many times somebody gets a bite at the apple with the PRET.

Mr. Stolz stated Sheriff Dwinell, you told us about what Hawthorne didn't do, what did he do once he was hired?

Sheriff Dwinell stated he was basically treated like a ride-a-long.

Mr. Stolz asked how often he went on ride-a-longs.

Sheriff Dwindle stated it depended on who was working which shift. We had been short staffed well over a year, if he was on the day shift with me, he was pretty much sitting in the office twiddling his thumbs unless I got sent on a call. Depending on what the call entailed. Traffic accident, I might have him directing traffic, watching my back making sure I don't get hit. Parking lot court security, that's kind of a lose term, he has no training he doesn't carry a firearm, but honestly if I need to step out for a minute, I need to know somebody with a cellphone is watching the courtroom that will call 911.

Mr. Stolz questioned up until the time he was in uniform you said, so if he was directing traffic, he would have been in uniform. When did you shift to purely office staff position? When did that occur?

Mr. Hawthorne stated it was January 2<sup>nd</sup> when I took over civil service process. When I was a trainee before I didn't even get to do civil service I was there just basically as an observer. I observed the officer and kind of how he was managing things, but I wouldn't take any reports. If people would come up to me, I would direct them toward the actual certified deputy. I agree with Mr. Muldoon, I don't want to be called up to testify and not have any idea of the legal standards or anything like that or if I missed a step, I have a bachelor's degree in finance economics, so I don't have a prior criminal justice experience to fall back on.

Sheriff Watson questioned if he ever wore a gun.

Mr. Hawthorne stated that was never allowed to carry a gun, and he never got his gun until December when he thought he would be going to camp. He never arrested anyone, but had transported someone after an officer arrested them. Never have written a ticket or a warning and don't get to touch the radar.

Sheriff Watson questioned when the clock started ticking.

Chief Bliemeister clarified Mr. Hawthorne was not sworn at any particular point

Mr. Hawthorne stated that was correct.

Chief Bliemeister asked when you are in the cruiser, you talked about traffic direction and control, you were in a uniform of a Wayne County Deputy Sheriff minus the gun belt, is that correct?

Mr. Hawthorne stated that was correct.

Chief Bliemeister during that time period, did you have any type of physical encounters at all? When we talk about arrests, that's kind of a loose term but do you have any type of physical encounters where you went hands on with anybody in that capacity?

Mr. Hawthorne responded no.

Chief Bliemeister stated there were three attempts at the PRET, correct?

Sheriff Dwinell stated there were three attempts at the PRET, however his first attempt to the PRET was last March and the Training Center sent us a letter stating there was an unprecedented demand for the April class and basically wasn't going to get in but was invited to take the PRET and be placed on the standby test and if you score a 36% or higher you will not have to retest in August.

### **MOTION**

Sheriff Watson moved to go into Executive Session to further discuss this matter. The reason for the Executive Session would be to protect the reputation of Mr. Hawthorne. We would like to have Mr. Muldoon, Ms. Urbanek, and Mr. Stolz present during the closed session. Mr. McCarthy seconded the motion. Voting in favor of the motion; Chief Jeffrey Bliemeister, Sheriff Larry Koranda, Chief Timothy Larby, Mr. Matthew McCarthy, Sheriff Jerry Watson, and Chief Tracy Wolf. The meeting went into closed session at 10:26 AM.

### **MOTION**

Sheriff Watson moved to come out of Executive Session. Sheriff Larry Koranda seconded the motion. Voting in favor of the motion; Chief Jeffrey Bliemeister, Sheriff Larry Koranda, Chief Timothy Larby, Mr. Matthew McCarthy, Sheriff Jerry Watson, and Chief Tracy Wolf. The meeting came out of closed session at 11:17 AM.

**MOTION**

Chief Tracy Wolf motioned to grant the waiver with the understanding that Mr. Nicholas Hawthorne pass the PRET for admission into the 199<sup>th</sup> Basic Training Class. He will perform no law enforcement duties from this date forward until he has graduated from the 199<sup>th</sup> Basic. Sheriff Jerry Watson seconded the motion.

Sheriff Larry Koranda mentioned from the Council, we believe from past hearings and it was your intention on Mr. Hawthorne's hire date of January 3, of 2017 to successfully fill out trainee no matter, however he was stated, in the change in status form for the Training Center. That January 3 is officially his one year start date. With this motion that is in place, the next available basic would be the 199<sup>th</sup> and that would be Mr. Hawthorne's one and only and last chance at getting into the Training Center.

Ms. Urbanek stated the purpose of the waiver is to protect Mr. Hawthorne as well as the Wayne County Sheriff's Office down the road if he would get certified July of 2018 and they see his hire date was clear back in 2017. The waiver is required that you either be done in a year or you have the waiver, the waiver protects his record, if you will.

Voting in favor of the motion; Chief Tracy Wolf, Chief Jeffrey Bliemeister. Sheriff Larry Koranda, Chief Timothy Larby, Mr. Matthew McCarthy, and Sheriff Jerry Watson.

- A. Date, Time & Location of Next Meeting
